

Restrictions Exemption Program – Valid Documentation

Kids Cancer Care staff, volunteers or other designates will verify valid documentation for proof of vaccination, a negative COVID-19 test, or medical exemption as required per the Restrictions Exemption Program.

Unfortunately, we are unable to welcome individuals who cannot provide one of the above required documentations. Participants ages 12 years and older who are unable to provide valid documentation will be required to leave the site immediately. If you have questions or concerns regarding this process, please call in advance so we can clarify and assist you.

<p>What constitutes valid documentation for proof of vaccination?</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To enter spaces participating in the Restrictions Exemption Program, people ages 12 and older must provide proof of vaccination. This includes a valid paper or digital vaccine record that shows the name, vaccine type and date of administration. • Adults ages 18 and over must also provide a valid government-issued photo identification that matches the vaccine record. • From September 20 to October 25, proof of partial vaccination (one dose) is considered acceptable as long as the dose was given more than two weeks before the time of the program or event. • After October 25, proof of full vaccination (two doses) is required.
<p>What constitutes valid documentation for proof of a negative COVID-19 test?</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Tests must be a privately paid and Health Canada-approved rapid antigen, rapid PCR or lab-based PCR test completed within the previous 72 hours. • Valid test results should be a written or printed copy that clearly outlines the type of test, time of sample collection, clear indication of a negative result and the laboratory that completed the test. • Photos of a rapid test result taken offsite is not sufficient.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Do not bring completed self-tests or rapid tests to businesses due to communicable disease risk. • Tests must not be from Alberta Health Services or Alberta Precision Laboratories.
<p>What constitutes valid documentation for proof of medical exemption?</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A valid medical exemption is the original signed letter from a physician or nurse practitioner that includes: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Person's name that matches their identification; and • Physician's or nurse practitioner's complete information, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Name, phone number, contact information, professional registration number and signature; ▪ Statement that there is a medical reason for not being fully vaccinated against COVID-19; and ▪ Duration for which the exemption is valid.
